

AWR 187-W Terrorism and WMD Awareness in the Workplace

Terrorism Awareness in the Workplace is a 30-minute, Web-based course designed to provide participants with awareness-level training in recognizing, reporting, and reacting to potential terrorist incidents in the workplace environment.

Participants will develop a broad understanding of terrorism, and will gain insight into the importance of protecting private sector resources. At the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- define and describe various factors of terrorism
- list and recognize various examples of WMD
- recognize suspicious activities, vehicles, and objects
- report potential terrorist threats to supervisors or security personnel
- react to potential terrorist threats, employing the concept of “Time, Distance, and Shielding.”

The goal of the course is to bridge preparedness gaps and spur a productive interaction between public and private sectors. The promotion of private sector relationships with local public agencies can generate greater protection and a safer environment for all local residents and generate cooperation between public and private safety agencies to protect the nation’s interests.

The course is designed to meet the awareness needs of private and public sector entities of various disciplines at all levels of the organization.

Course topics include:

Introduction to Terrorism

- What is Terrorism?
- Where Do Terrorists Come From?
- Who and What Do Terrorists Target?
- How Do Terrorists Attack?

Weapons of Mass Destruction:

- Definition of WMD and CBRNE (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear, and Explosive)
- Examples of WMD
- Which Weapon is a Terrorist Most Likely to Use?
- Components of Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs)

Recognizing, Reporting, and Reacting to Terrorism

- Recognizing Suspicious Activities, Vehicles and Objects
- Time, Distance, and Shielding
- Scenario: "Salem Incident"
- Scenario: "What Should Jerry Have Done?"
- Scenario: "Working Place Explosives"
- Scenario: "Trapped in Your Workplace"
